I am interested in hearing your thoughts on all topics!



A final thank you goes to Larry Messing and Mike Morris for helping gather the cars and yellow paddles from the branch after the session and then organizing them into public run cuts.


The session was given positive reviews by those participating and they look to do it again next time.

Update on the Chloe

Burners, manifold and arch have been installed after boiler was lifted and fitted to frame. They can be easily installed from below firebox once boiler is mounted. This is possible due to the Chloe's unique frame design.

Burner control valve bracket has been machined out of aluminum and mounted to the back of the tender tank lip. It is in the center of the tender back to allow either right or left hand control for the firing valve.





There is no pilot light on this loco, as there are only eight burners. Steam lines and header have been connected in the smoke-box. Steam line sealing packing is the round circle at the top of the flue sheet. Steam line with elbow is shown going into header.
