Train rides for MLS and Sahuaro Central RR ended on April 28th. Last ride with the Hurlbut ened with a broken axle on the tender, so riders walked back to the platform. Bob Rauperstrauch made two new axles for that front truck and now has the rear truck axles to replace.

Work continues on the second trolley, hopefully finished by fall.

The second trolley frame has been expanded. Trolley seats and backs have been welded and are in place.

Wheels, side frames, bolsters, axles and couplers have been made and are ready to assemble for the trolley. Scotty Brooks has also been working on wheels, couplers and axles for the new engine #1, and 3 gondolas Gary Gorman has designed and assembled the outer shell for #1 locomotive.
